Spirituality- St Giles' C.E. Primary School

The 'Wow's, 'Ows' and 'Nows'

The language of spirituality begins from a Christian understanding that everyone is a valued creation, individually and uniquely made by God, like pots made by a potter (Isaiah 64:8). Yet in life things happen that impact on the physical 'pot' of life and create cracks that provide a glimpse of something 'beyond' the tangible.

Cracks may be caused when something so good and breathtaking that the pot expands and cracks- the **WOWs** of life.

Cracks may happen when something challenging happens and threatens the comfort of everyday. The **OWs** of life. Cracks can also happen in the stillness and ordinariness of everyday- the **NOWs** of life. A moment of stillness, a pause, prayer can create a crack in the normal, physical everyday.







This week, children have been reflecting on the Christian value of PEACE.

When we fully understand what Jesus was trying to teach us it can create a **WOW** moment in our mind. Jesus used examples in nature to try and get us to focus on what is important. And when we do that it can give us an overwhelming feeling of peace. Jesus is not teaching us that it is wrong to work hard for the right things, instead he is pointing out that worrying about the wrong things will not bring happiness, but stress and the absence of peace.

Each week, children through school explore a Christian value and reflect on 'WOW' and 'OW' moments, culminating in pupil led Worship in St Giles Church each Friday.

Parents/carers are welcome to join us for at 9.00am each week.



This term we will be focussing in school on the value PEACE.

We hope your family will find these ideas helpful as you
explore the value and have fun together.

Saul was overcome with sadness for what he had done. "May the Lord reward you richly for the way you have treated me today. I know now that one day David you will indeed be king."

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

The Nobel Peace Prize

Alfred Nobel was a 19th century Swedish inventor and engineer. He invented dynamite, which was used to destroy many things! Perhaps because of this, in his will, Nobel left money and instructions to award five special prizes each year. He said that one of these, the Nobel **Peace** Prize, should be given to a person, or group of people, who had done the most or best work to promote **peace** between nations.

- . The Nobel Peace Prize is presented in Oslo on 10th December each year by the King of Norway
- . The winner is given a diploma, a medal and over 1 million US dollars to carry on their work

HALL OF FAME

Rigoberta Menchu

Very few people had heard of Rigoberta Menchu when it was announced that she had won the Nobel **Peace** Prize in 1992. However, Rigoberta was one of

the bravest women ever to have been awarded this prestigious prize. She was born in 1959 into a Mayan Indian family who lived and worked in Guatemala. The Mayan people were treated cruelly by the government and the army in Guatemala. The Menchu family were Christians and they believed it was their duty to fight against such injustice. The family learnt Spanish from the local priests so they could stand up for the rights of their people. One by one the members of the family were killed in the most dreadful way by the government soldiers, first Rigoberta's 16 year old brother, then her father because he was a union leader and then finally her mother. Rigoberta knew she would be next, so she escaped to Mexico where she wrote her life story and made a film about the bad things happening in Guatemala. Rigoberta continued to stand up against injustice and for more than twenty years worked as a UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador to promote a culture of peace and protect the rights of people to live in their own country.



Harvest 2024 Appeal.

This winter may be challenging for many, with fuel prices set to rise in October and food costs remaining a persistent issue. Over the past year, there has been a steady increase in the number of adults and children relying on our foodbanks, as the ongoing cost of living crisis leaves many unable to afford basic essentials like food.

Walking to school...

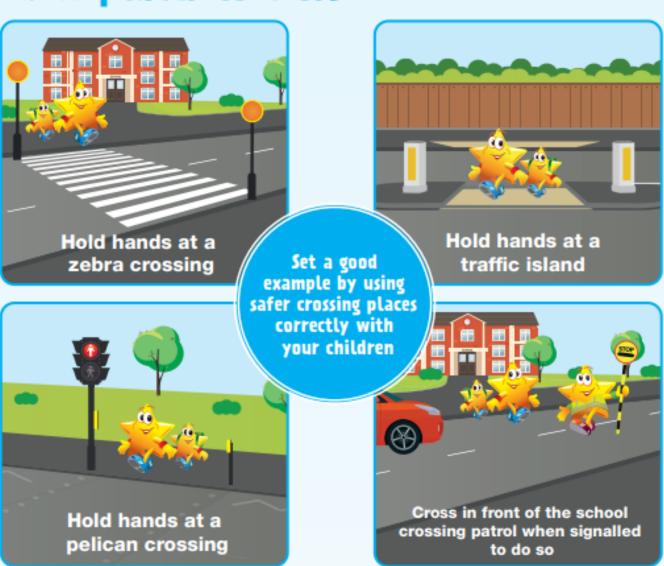
Good for you, good for everyone

Promote these steps below to cross the road safely:

Find the safest place to cross, are there any zebra, pelican or other crossings you can use?

LISTEN carefully for traffic/engine noises

When it is safe, cross in a straight line and do not run. Keep looking and listening while you cross.



THINK if traffic is coming let it pass.

Make sure your child can be seen.

Fluorescent materials are good for daytime,

Reflective materials are good in the dark.

Always wear something bright!

Should I keep my Child Off

school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics

Hand, foot and mouth	Glandular fever
Head lice	Tonsillitis
Threadworms	Slapped cheek

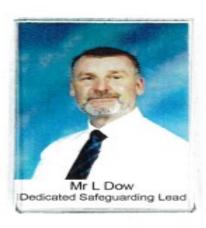
