

Minutes of Our Steering Group Meetings (2022-23) Year 6 UNICEF Ambassadors

12/09/22 Article Of The Week: 38 And 39. Invited: All UNICEF Ambassadors with Staff Agenda: To talk about roles and charters.

Mrs Mavi welcomed everyone and congratulated all for being elected as UNICEF ambassadors to represent their class and school. Firstly, we shared that the pupils in our school are rights holders and that the staff are duty bearers. They do as much as possible to ensure that we have fulfilled all of our rights at home, school, and anywhere in our local community. We agreed that preparing assemblies linked to article of the week was a good idea to raise awareness about CRC and help everyone to reflect on the important messages to impact our school community as well as global issues that affect us. Mrs Mavi suggested that different UNICEF ambassador teams could lead on assemblies across the year. It was fun to meet the new Year 1 ambassadors and make them feel welcome!

Then, we talked about the war between Ukraine and Russia. We also shared what peace meant to us. These were some of our ideas: Quiet, calm, and still, stop fighting, protect others from harm, be welcoming, and make everyone feel happy. We then spoke about the class charters, and what we have been talking about in class. In classes, the children discussed which articles they felt were important to their class and then designed charters for those articles. We looked at the people in our schools who keep us Safe (our DSL's - Designated Safeguarding Lead-Mr Dow, Deputy DSL-Mr Dakin, Mrs Mavi, Mrs Leonowicz) and how this links to Article 19 - Protection from violence, abuse and neglect.

Eboni shared that she admired Article 2; **Non-discrimination**. All rights apply to all children without exception. It is the state's(national government's)obligation to protect children from any form of discrimination and to take positive action to promote their rights.

We all had great fun and look forward to continuing our RRS journey where we are now aiming for Gold!

20/09/22

Article Of The Week: 1,4 and 41 Invited: Lower KS2 and Year 6 Unicef Ambassadors with Mrs Mavi & Miss Mander Agenda: To collate ideas for Gold action Plan. To spread awareness of the Outright School Programme

Mrs Mavi shared the report following the silver award. We discussed our gold award journey and ideas for action plan. We looked at outcome 8 and 9 in strand C. Lots of ideas were discussed to raise pupil input into policies like Online safety policy to protect children from bullying and raise awareness for keeping safe online. Many children agreed that they spent a lot of time online researching or completing homework and this was important. We read the policy on the big screen and suggested which articles could link to it. Next we watched a video about Outright. Outright organisation helps to speak out about children's rights. We linked this to Article 12-About expressing our voices and our voices and opinions are respected at our school. But children across the world don't have the same opportunities and we need to raise their issues by campaigning Campaigning is about taking part in organised actions to bring out positive changes. Local councillors and MPs can help to organise this or sign a petition. Year 6 will be sharing and talking about campaigning. Lower KS2 will be presenting a presentation with Miss Mander. Covid 19 has affected many people mentally. We discussed Article 24 about staying healthy. WaterAid is an international charity that supports young people who can't always have access to clean water and sanitation.

Ideas for the presentation:

- 1. WaterAid- This is an international charity, which locates water features such as taps and wells around the world to support families who may not be able to afford such things.
- 2. In the book 'Poverty And Hunger', page 22 speaks about the importance of having clean water to decrease the chance of illness and disease.
- 3. We can help to support poorer and less fortunate families like this by donating items that we may not use anymore, such as money, toys, clothes, or even food. This may not seem a lot to us but for individuals like this, it helps.
- 4. St. Giles does this by participating in events such as Harvest, where we can all take part in donating food and toiletry items around our house. Two years ago also sold packets of rice in 2019, which didn't cost a lot of money, but helped people around places like Afghanistan, Africa, and Ukraine.

27/09/22

Articles Of The Week: 2 and 30 Invited: Yr 5 and 6 Ambassadors With Staff Agenda: To raise awareness and create a presentation about Black History Month.

We spent time looking at the difference between wants and needs. We discovered that needs are those things that enable us to live healthy, safe and fulfilled lives. This helped us understand how the rights of a child are based around needs and how this links with the UN Convention on the Rights of a Child. It was important to help younger ambassadors and other children understand the difference between a want and a need by playing a game. It was fun!

This month is Black History Month and we were speaking about how it also helps to spread diversity. Sach says that: 'As a person of the black race myself, I believe that Black History Month helps me because although I am not discriminated against here at this school, it just helps people like me'.

1/10/22 Articles Of The Week: 24 and 27 Invited: Yr 4,5 and 6 Ambassadors With Staff Agenda: To spread awareness about how important Harvest is. We started to share our knowledge of Harvest, and how important it is to us. Sachkaranveer says that 'St. Giles has participated in an event like this before. We have donated rice to poorer countries in Africa'. Mrs Mavi then introduced the idea of creating posters about Harvest (or Acrostic poems) to help the school know more about the event. We started with speaking about privacy. We all shared that we receive a commendatory amount of privacy in St. Giles, and our duty bearers help us to maintain this. We shared what privacy meant to us, and for example, Kye said that 'Sharing personal information is a very high risk especially when people you don't know or trust get a hold of them.' The acronym 'PANTS' can help younger years, who don't know much about privacy, to understand how to keep their personal information safe and away from online predators. We talked about our Online safety policy and reminders.

Article Of The Week: 45 Invited: Yr 4,5 and 6 Ambassadors With Staff Agenda: To learn more and talk about World Children's Day

Articles Of The Week: 2 and 23 Invited: Yr 3 and 4 Ambassadors With Staff Agenda: To educate ourselves on how to treat members of the community with disabilities.

On the 3rd December, we celebrate International Day Of People with Disabilities. We focus on Articles 2 and 23 on this day. Article 2 introduces the right to non-discrimination, and to be treated equally, whatever your ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status. Article 23 makes sure that a child with a disability is treated no different to other children, and can take part in any activity. It is not only important that children with disabilities know these rights, but children without them too, so that they know how to act when someone around them has a disability.

04/01/23

Article of the week: 12 Invited: Yr 5 and 6 Ambassadors With Staff Agenda: To educate ourselves and learn more about children who changed the world.

We discussed that **Article 12** ensures participation, and makes sure that children take part in local activities at home and school. We then explored a poem by **Kuli Kholi**, speaking up for children who are taken advantage of. We also read "**Children Who Changed The World**" and recognised that these children knew that they were independent and brave and stood up for other children who may not have been able to do that/were not as confident.

20/01/23 Articles Of The Week: 7 and 8 Invited: Yr 3 and 4 Ambassadors With Staff Agenda: To be proud of who we are and what religion we come from.

Article 7 states that every child has the right to be given a name at birth, and to be cared for. Article 8 states that every child has an identity, such as a nationality and relationships with family. At St. Giles, staff make sure that every child is receiving this treatment. We were asked questions like: Do you know your religion? Did you choose it? Are you happy with your current identity? Do you know your nationality? Are you proud of it? We all then made acrostic poems of our names. Here is an example that Kavi wrote: K stands for the 5 K's which are part of my religion. A stands for A times tables professional. V stands for Very aware of different people's nationalities. I stands for Indian which is my nationality. This shows that Kavi is proud of his culture and religion, and is not scared to embrace himself.
